History of Kansas City

Kansas City is the largest city in the state of Missouri and serves as the anchor for the Greater Kansas City Metropolitan Area, which also includes the city of Kansas City, Kansas and its suburbs.

Founded in 1838 and incorporated by the State of Missouri as the City of Kansas in 1853, Kansas City has a long and proud history.

During the Civil War Kansas City was a flash point of tension over the issue of whether the Kansas Territory should be admitted to the Union as a free or a slave state. Tensions reached a climax in August 1863 when the Union Army's temporary jail in Kansas City collapsed killing several women related to pro-slavery activist William Quantrill. Quantrill responded by leading a raid, known as the Lawrence Massacre, in which 150 people were killed and the anti-slavery town of Lawrence was almost completely destroyed.

After the war Kansas City beat out its rival city to the north, St Joseph, for trade dominance and became the economic powerhouse of the area. Kansas City's rise to economic dominance can be attributed to the passage of a bill in Congress to build the Hannibal Railroad Bridge at Broadway Avenue. From 1869 when the bridge opened the railroads helped to make possible the transformation of Kansas City into one of the world's largest cattle markets.

The city continued to grow as a result of the cattle market boom, and in 1889 Kansas City adopted a new charter dividing its 60,000 residents into 14 wards. William Rockhill Nelson convinced the city to build its first convention hall, which opened in 1899 at 12th and Wyandotte.

By the beginning of World War I Kansas City had grown to 248,000 residents and was highly influenced by the infamous Pendergast family. James Pendergast, an influential man who had gained influence by opening a tavern and hotel in Kansas City, won a seat on the City Council in 1887. Following his death in 1912, his son Tom took power and virtuallyruled the city until 1940 when LP Cookingham was hired to reform city management.

Since the Second World War, Kansas City has continued to grow. Annexations in the 1950s and 60s increased Kansas City's land area to more than 318 square miles. The 1970s saw the construction of Kansas City International Airport, the world's only matched football and base-ball stadiums, Kemper Arena, and H Roe Bartle Exposition Hall.

Kansas City is proud of its history, but it has also developed far beyond its roots in the cattle markets. Today Kansas City is well-known for its foreign trade zone, international connections, and its beautiful architecture. It is said to have more fountains than any city in the world except, perhaps, Rome, and more boulevards than any city save Paris. It is no wonder, then, that Kansas City is known as both the "Heart of America" and the "Paris of the Plains".

About Kansas City

From its early trading post beginnings, Kansas City has grown to be a metropolitan area of 2.2 million people, and includes cities in Missouri and Kansas. Located near the geographic and population centers of the US, it truly is the "Heart of America." This asset has helped Kansas City maintain its reputation as a crossroads of transportation and as an international trade hub.

Fortune magazine ranks Kansas City as one of the 20 best cities in the USA for international business.

Kansas City has a vibrant and diversified economy, with a wealth of small and medium size businesses. There are also 10 *Fortune* 1000 companies headquartered in the KC region, and more than 25 *Fortune* 500 companies have a significant presence here. Some of the most recognized household brands make their home in KC – Hallmark Cards, H&R Block, Lee Jeans and Sprint-Nextel.

Kansas City's economy is a nearly exact reflection of the U.S. economy. This means that our economy doesn't hinge on one or two industries. Our employers and workforce are protected from dramatic peaks and valleys experienced by other markets.

Its metro area has been named fifth for business opportunities by *Expansion Management*. KC is also a "Top Major Market for business development" according to *Southern Business & Development*.

Kansas City's French History

Kansas City actually traces its roots back to early French traders. In 1821 a Frenchman, Francois Chouteau, came up the Missouri River and established a trading post on the waterway in what is now Kansas City. Chouteau and several other French families constituted the first non-Indian settlement in Kansas City. From its early trade post beginnings Kansas City, Missouri, has grown to be the largest city in a metropolitan area of 2.2 million people. The metro area includes cities in Missouri and Kansas. It enjoys the resources and strengths from both states, and includes more than 136 cities and 18 counties.

Climate

KC enjoys each of the four seasons. Spring, when *Futurallia* will be held, is a beautiful time of the year with mild temperatures prevailing. Average temperatures in May range from a high of 76 to a low of 57 Fahrenheit. Kansas City, with its fountains, parks and boulevard is a true showplace in the spring.






Cost of Living Data Series-2nd Quarter 2010

Composite Cost of Living-2nd Quarter 2010








Kansas City Summary


